

THE NEW BEAUTY SHOP

The beauty salon at Mendelson Assisted living also underwent renovations this year for a complete transformation! The salon is a source of familiarity and self-autonomy for many residents. It is a place where they can relax, cast away their cares for a time and recapture a bit of their life.

Thanks to the family of former Mendelson resident, Mary Forte, the salon was upgraded for the first time in twenty years. The old beige wallpaper was replaced with gold mosaic designs and brass accents to give the room a more glamorous look. The new appearance offers a more luxurious experience that leaves residents not only feeling refreshed but pampered like celebrities.

Clausen Manor followed Mendelson's leap into the future, advancing care through risk prevention and smart technology. SafelyYou is a fall prevention system that uses Artificial Intelligence video technology with remote support to catch fall risks more quickly and give families better peace of mind.

How does it work?

AI enabled cameras are installed in the bedroom where 70% of falls occur for those in memory care.

After receiving consent from the family, cameras run on-site around the clock but only preserve the video surrounding a fall or an event that ends with the resident on the floor. As such, staff can immediately act, review footage, and make real time decisions about future care.

Because of the support for this new technology, Clausen has witnessed a lower fall response time of one minute due to the notifications sent to team members after a fall occurs. ER visits have decreased as well as staff now have the ability to review footage of the fall and make preventative changes to the environment.

With thirty-six games at their fingertips, residents can catch ladybugs, prep a salad, shoot pool and more!

But what makes Tovertafel truly special is its ability to increase physical activity, stimulate conversations and enhance memory recall. Tovertafel has been proved to engage individuals at physical, social, cognitive and sensory levels, making it an absolute game changer in memory care.

As we express our deepest appreciation for the support that made Tovertafel, SafelyYou, and other projects possible, we also want to thank everyone who contributed their time, talents, and treasures to Lourdes Senior Community throughout the year.

Beyond the major projects, your support facilitated numerous accomplishments, from apartment upgrades to new patio furniture, garden flowers, and activity supplies. Together, you have played a crucial role in upholding Lourdes' mission and ensuring our continued leadership in quality senior care.

As we move into the future, Lourdes Senior Community remains steadfast in our commitment to provide a comprehensive continuum of care for seniors and their families. Since our inception in 1965, Lourdes has been a beacon of quality senior care, and we are determined to carry that legacy forward into 2024, honoring the unique needs and preferences of each resident we serve.

At Lourdes, our focus isn't solely on the products and services we offer; it's on the residents who call Lourdes Senior Community home. We are committed to learning their stories, understanding their hobbies and skills, and meeting their individual needs with compassion and respect. As we move forward, our aim is to enrich the living experience for our residents by enhancing entertainment and activities, providing educational opportunities, integrating smart technology, and elevating our amenities across campus.

"We are ambitious in the goals we want to accomplish their year," said Rich Acho, President and Chief Executive Officer of Lourdes Senior Community. "There are many new and exciting opportunities out there, and so much is being done to enhance senior living. Senior communities aren't just a place for care anymore. They're an experience, an opportunity to join

clubs, try new hobbies, visit new places and learn new things. They now have salons, movie theaters, wellness centers, outdoor dining areas and more. There's really no end to the possibilities."

For Lourdes, one of those possibilities is to expand our offered services. In 2024, Angela Hospice will open a 15-room inpatient hospice in the Lourdes building. This is an offering we haven't had on our campus but have talked through with our strategic planning process. We are grateful for the opportunity to give residents on hospice the special care they deserve in their last days.

We have also entered the preliminary planning phase for an independent living expansion. A recent market feasibility study underscored the need for an additional 80-100 independent living apartments in Waterford by the time baby boomers reach the age of 80, which is in 2026. These individuals are seeking residences with modern amenities, enhanced technology, more socialization opportunities, a dining experience, an outdoor area that offers different activities, and much more.

To meet this growing demand, we have outlined a comprehensive expansion plan, which includes the addition of ranch-style villas and a state-of-the-art independent living

building. The villas, nestled near the current St. Jude building off of Marwood Drive, will offer 2-bedroom, 2-bathroom layouts spanning approximately 1,200 square feet each. Notably, two of these villas will serve as homes for our beloved Dominican Sisters of Peace, who currently reside on Lourdes Campus.

In addition to the villas, we are thrilled to introduce the concept for a stunning 60-unit independent living building, boasting lakefront views from every unit, and complete with balconies or patios for residents to enjoy. We will offer various unit types to include 1 bedroom, 2 bedrooms and 1 bedroom/den layout options. Complemented by amenities such as a movie theater, wellness center, and dining in both indoor and outdoor spaces with views of Scott Lake, in addition to outdoor activities.

We anticipate breaking ground on these ambitious projects in late 2024 or early 2025, with completion slated for the third quarter of 2026. These expansions signify our unwavering dedication to meeting the evolving needs of our residents and the broader community, ensuring that Lourdes remains a premier destination for exceptional senior living.


